The "Circle 4 World"

The images on the left represent ways the people of God are sent out to heal, bless, restore, and invite others into God's story.

Luke 4/ Isaiah 61

Jesus' reading of Isaiah 61 in Luke 4:18-21 is quoted on the sides of the mural.

The "Circle 2 World"


The left side of the mural depicts a multiethnic group of faces showing mourning, despair, numbness, anger, and apathy. Some are blindfolded, others gagged, others not listening. Chains are woven throughout.

The Pyramids

Harking back to the Exodus story, the Pyramids represent a time of slavery and oppression for Jesus' people. *The Exodus story of freedom and deliverance is a powerful image for the black church.

Chains Being Broken

As Jesus followers speak the story of God and speak out against injustice, chains of sin and oppression are being broken.



A Church Being Rebuilt

Black churches that were burnt or destroyed are being rebuilt. Also, the larger church is being built upon the foundational work of justice, evangelism, prayer, and mission.

People in Prayer

A multiethnic group of Jesus followers are praying for His kingdom to be built. Hands of prayer surround and support His work.

A Classroom

A group of children are being taught in a vibrant classroom.

About the Babies

The babies have the names Sandra, Michael, Trayvon, and Tamir written on their swaddling cloths.

Jesus the Deliverer ("Circle 3")

A crucified & resurrected Jesus is breaking a chain with his right hand and has his other hand resting on a hammer crushing a serpent made of chains (representing evil, injustice, broken systems, and sin).

Genesis 3:15 - "And I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will crush your head..."

Freedom for the Prisoners

Stigmata hands are pulling apart prison bars and releasing captives (black and non-black) into freedom.

The Reconciled People of God

A multiethnic black-led movement of Jesus followers emerge from the empty tomb to declare the good news of Jesus and pursue his kingdom of justice & righteousness. Their halos mark the presence of the Holy Spirit, and they are breathing out water symbolizing the Living Water of Jesus.

TELL THE STORY OF LUKE 4 & MOVE TO MURAL






CIRCLE 1 - The Beautiful World

CIRCLE 3 - Enter Jesus

"Jesus took our personal brokenness and our world's brokenness into the grave with him. Jesus came to speak the truth to both victim and oppressor, to free us from ourselves, our sin & brokenness, and to break the chains of our personal & systemic brokenness. He reconciles us to each other across all lines of division and offers us new hearts and new love to work for justice if we say yes to him."

CIRCLE 4 - Sent Together to Heal

A BETTER WORLD : SCRIPT

1 page, no pictures.

1. **Gain their attention.** "Where do you find hope?"
2. **Introduce yourself (ask their name), state your purpose, and ask permission.** "We're with InterVarsity Christian Fellowship and we want to discuss hope and how God might be at work amidst the racial tension in America today."
3. **Invite them to put a sticker on an image on Panel 1, how have they have been affected by racial injustice.** "There has been a lot of news lately about the pain the black community has been encountering: injustice, brutality, and even death. Which boxes best describe how this has affected you?" (Confused, Exhausted, Despairing, Hopeful, Frustrated, Grieving / Sad, Angry, Fear, Other)

Why did you place your stickers where you did?

What gives you hope for change amidst the pain expressed by many in the black community?

4. **Tell the story of Luke 4 and move to large artwork.** "We are InterVarsity Christian Fellowship. We believe that Jesus offers hope in the midst of racial injustice and pain. Come look at the art over here."

THE CENTER OF THE MURAL (CIRCLE 3)
